Problem 1. (8 points) We have shown that $A(h) = \frac{1}{2h}[f(x+h) - f(x-h)]$ is an approximation of $f'(x)$ of order 2.

- (a) Determine the leading term of the error.
- (b) Apply Richardson extrapolation to $A(h)$ and $A(3h)$ to obtain an approximation of $f'(x)$ of higher order.

Solution.

- (a) Our goal is to compute C such that $A(h) = f'(x) + Ch^2 + O(h^3)$. By Taylor's theorem, we have (note that, because we will divide by h , we know from the beginning that we need to compute up to h^3 in the following)

$$\begin{aligned}f(x+h) &= f(x) + hf'(x) + \frac{h^2}{2}f''(x) + \frac{h^3}{6}f'''(x) + O(h^4), \\f(x-h) &= f(x) - hf'(x) + \frac{h^2}{2}f''(x) - \frac{h^3}{6}f'''(x) + O(h^4).\end{aligned}$$

Subtracting these, we find

$$f(x+h) - f(x-h) = 2hf'(x) + \frac{h^3}{3}f'''(x) + O(h^4).$$

Hence, $A(h) = f'(x) + \frac{h^2}{6}f'''(x) + O(h^3)$.

- (b) We just showed that $A(h) = f'(x) + Ch^2 + O(h^3)$ for some constant C (we even determined C but it doesn't matter here). Correspondingly, $A(3h) = f'(x) + 9Ch^2 + O(h^3)$. Hence, $9A(h) - A(3h) = (9-1)f'(x) + O(h^3)$.

The Richardson extrapolation of $A(h)$ and $A(3h)$ therefore is:

$$\begin{aligned}\frac{9A(h) - A(3h)}{8} &= \frac{9}{8 \cdot 2h}[f(x+h) - f(x-h)] - \frac{1}{8 \cdot 4h}[f(x+2h) - f(x-2h)] \\&= \frac{1}{32h}[-f(x+2h) + 18f(x+h) - 18f(x-h) + f(x-2h)]\end{aligned}$$

This is an approximation of $f'(x)$ of higher order. (Can you see why it actually has order 4?)

Problem 2. (3 points) Recall that a cubic spline $S(x)$ through $(x_0, y_0), \dots, (x_n, y_n)$ with $x_0 < x_1 < \dots < x_n$ is piecewise defined by n cubic polynomials $S_1(x), \dots, S_n(x)$ such that $S(x) = S_i(x)$ for $x \in [x_{i-1}, x_i]$.

Name **two** common boundary conditions of cubic splines and state their mathematical definition.

Solution. The following are common choices for the boundary conditions of cubic splines:

- *natural*: $S_1''(x_0) = S_n''(x_n) = 0$

The resulting splines are simply called *natural cubic splines*.

- *not-a-knot*: $S_1'''(x_1) = S_2'''(x_1)$ and $S_n'''(x_{n-1}) = S_{n-1}'''(x_{n-1})$
- *periodic*: $S_1'(x_0) = S_n'(x_n)$ and $S_1''(x_0) = S_n''(x_n)$ (only makes sense if $y_0 = y_n$)

There are other common choices such *clamped cubic splines* for which the first derivatives at the endpoints are being set ("clamped") to user-specified values.

Problem 3. (8 points) Use the trapezoidal rule to approximate $\int_1^3 \frac{1}{x} dx = \log(3)$.

- Use $h = 1$ and $h = \frac{1}{2}$.
- Using Richardson extrapolation, combine the previous two approximations to obtain an approximation of higher order. (No need to simplify your answer.)
- The extrapolated approximation is equivalent to the outcome of which method applied with $h = \frac{1}{2}$?

Solution. Let us write $f(x) = \frac{1}{x}$.

$$(a) \int_1^3 f(x) dx \approx \frac{h}{2} [f(1) + 2f(2) + f(3)] = \frac{1}{2} \left[1 + 2 \cdot \frac{1}{2} + \frac{1}{3} \right] = \frac{7}{6} \approx 1.1667$$

$$\int_1^3 f(x) dx \approx \frac{h}{2} \left[f(1) + 2f\left(\frac{3}{2}\right) + 2f(2) + 2f\left(\frac{5}{2}\right) + f(3) \right] = \frac{1}{4} \left[1 + 2 \cdot \frac{2}{3} + 2 \cdot \frac{1}{2} + 2 \cdot \frac{2}{5} + \frac{1}{3} \right] = \frac{67}{60} \approx 1.1167$$

- Let us write $A(h)$ for the approximation from the trapezoidal rule, and A^* for the true value of the integral.

Since $A(h)$ is an approximation of order 2, we expect $A(h) \approx A^* + Ch^2$ for some constant C .

Correspondingly, $A(1) \approx A^* + C$ and $A\left(\frac{1}{2}\right) \approx A^* + \frac{1}{4}C$. Hence, $4A\left(\frac{1}{2}\right) - A(1) \approx (4 - 1)A^* = 3A^*$.

Therefore, the Richardson extrapolation is $\frac{1}{3} [4A\left(\frac{1}{2}\right) - A(1)] = \frac{1}{3} \left[4 \cdot \frac{67}{60} - \frac{7}{6} \right] = \frac{11}{10} = 1.1$.

- Simpson's rule

Problem 4. (8 points) Determine the minimal polynomial $P(x)$ interpolating $(-2, 1), (0, 2), (5, 2)$.

- (a) Write down the polynomial in Lagrange form.
- (b) Write down the polynomial in Newton form.
- (c) Suppose the above points lie on the graph of a smooth function $f(x)$. Write down an “explicit” formula for $f(x) - P(x)$, the error when using the interpolating polynomial to approximate $f(x)$.

Solution.

- (a) The interpolating polynomial in Lagrange form is

$$P(x) = 1 \frac{x(x-5)}{-2(-2-5)} + 2 \frac{(x+2)(x-5)}{(0+2)(0-5)} + 2 \frac{(x+2)x}{(5+2)5}.$$

(If we had a reason to do so (we don't!), we could expand that expression to find $P(x) = 2 + \frac{5x}{14} - \frac{x^2}{14}$.)

- (b) Newton's divided differences for the four points are:

$$\begin{array}{c|cc} -2 & 1 & \\ & \frac{2-1}{0-(-2)} = \frac{1}{2} & \\ & & \frac{0-\frac{1}{2}}{5-(-2)} = -\frac{1}{14} \\ 0 & 2 & \\ & \frac{2-2}{5-0} = 0 & \\ 5 & 2 & \end{array}$$

Accordingly, reading the coefficients from the top edge of the triangle (as shaded above), the Newton form is

$$P(x) = 1 + \frac{1}{2}(x+2) - \frac{1}{14}(x+2)x.$$

(Since the interpolating polynomial is unique, this polynomial must be the same as the one in the first part.)

- (c) $f(x) - P(x) = \frac{f'''(\xi)}{3!}(x+2)x(x-5)$ for some $\xi \in [-2, 5]$ (assuming that $x \in [-2, 5]$ as well).

Problem 5. (3 points) Suppose that $f(x)$ is a smooth function such that $|f^{(n)}(x)| \leq \frac{n!}{4}$ for all $x \in [-1, 1]$ and all $n \geq 0$. Suppose we approximate $f(x)$ on the interval $[-1, 1]$ by a polynomial interpolation $P(x)$. How many Chebyshev nodes do we need to use in order to guarantee that the maximal error is at most 10^{-3} ?

Solution. We know that, using n Chebyshev nodes, the error is bounded as

$$\max_{x \in [-1, 1]} |f(x) - P_{n-1}(x)| \leq \frac{1}{2^{n-1} n!} \max_{\xi \in [-1, 1]} |f^{(n)}(\xi)| \leq \frac{1}{2^{n+1}}.$$

We need to choose n so that $2^{n+1} \geq 10^3$.

Knowing that $2^{10} = 1024 > 10^3$, we conclude that we need $n+1 \geq 10$ and, thus, $n = 9$ Chebyshev nodes.
